

uring the farewell Mass for Father Stephen H. Howell, '63 on May 18, Junipero Serra alumnus Mark Geenen, Class of 1978, called to mind the enduring image many students will remember when they think about Father Stephen Howell.

"He is walking down the halls of Serra, brows furrowed, lips locked together, fists tightly clenched, shoulders draw up around his neck," said Geenen.

But as many Padres found in times of distress, "his veneer of toughness is among the thinnest shells around," said Geenen. "That drill sergeant exterior is a ruse — inside, he is a thoughtful, caring individual, a real softy. At the same time, he is a leader, a loyal man, a key contributor, and a fine example of a Christian human being."

After twenty seven years of service to the Junipero Serra community, Fr. Howell moved on to Notre Dame High School in Belmont on July 1, to serve as the

school's chaplain. Father Joe Bradley, '73 stepped up as Serra's second

President in school history.

The years Fr. Howell spent at Serra constitute the largest chapter of his life. As a young priest in 1975, he returned to his alma mater and joined the faculty, utilizing his history degree from the University of San Francisco.

He was thrilled to come back to Serra, where during his own high school years, he looked up to many of the priests who served on the faculty.

"One of the reasons I became a Diocesan priest was because the priests at Serra had a real influence on me," he said. "I knew I wanted to be a priest and an educator."

He learned that he was being assigned to Serra while serving in the parish of St. Timothy in San Mateo in his first year of priesthood.

"When the call came, I was very happy to move back into education," he said. Just three years later, he was named the first president of the school, and he and the school's Serra in Seattle

Throughout my years of seminary study and eleven years as a priest, including four years as chaplain at Serra, he has been a genuine source of support and encouragement. I am forever grateful and consider it a privilege and blessing to follow him in the role as President. Perhaps the real tribute is simply my resolve to continue in the spirit of his ministry.

We have a sacred, time-honored tradition of sending our graduates into the larger community in roles of service. I feel very blessed to continue this mission with our families and our faculty and staff.

first lay principal Michael Peterson, put together a job description as the years progressed. Along the way, he has come to have a profound appreciation for Catholic school education. "Catholic education is the key for the future of the Church and society in general," he said. "We are making good Catholics, and we're making good members of society."

His lifelong commitment to Catholic education will never be forgotten. A number of students — past and present — have benefitted from the Howell-McDermott-Rach scholarship that Fr. Howell established in memory of deceased members of his family. Many more will benefit in the future, ensuring that Fr. Howell's passion for education will allow students to learn and grow in an environment that reflects the values of the Catholic faith.

"I wanted to ensure that for anyone who wants to come to Junipero Serra, money will not be the sole determining factor," he said. "Middle class and poor students will always need access

Moving on from Serra has been a test of character. The length of his assignment at Serra was unusual, and he is grateful that the various archbishops over the years have allowed him to stay

"I've been here for more than half my life," he said. "Moving on is going to be a challenge, but I'm looking forward to it."

As Chaplain at NDB, things may seem a little topsy-turvy at first. "Instead of 980 boys, there will be 760 girls," he said, laughing, "It will be different."

But he'll still be in familiar territory, thanks to the Tri-School program that has been in place over the last decade. "It's not like I'm going to a foreign land," he said. "Because of the sharing, there's a knowledge and comfort level."

The faculty, staff and students he's left behind at Serra will remember him as one of the most important elements of a Padre education, especially a group of students who came through the school in the early 1980s.

Calling themselves the "B Team," they were disaffected, received poor grades, and desperately needed a guiding influence in their teenage years. Fr. Howell proved to be their salvation.

"He has touched the lives of hundreds of young men," said Peterson. "Kids who were suffering academically, spiritually, physically.

"Often times he was the only person willing to listen. In many ways they were his flock, and he was their shepherd."


## MIKE WILCOX '85 RECALLS HOW FATHER HOWELL HELPED THE 'B TEAM' FIND THEIR PLACE AT SERRA

As an anthropologist I am interested in limnality, rites of passage, events that mark our transition from one part of life to another.

High school is one of these times.

For some, this is a time of weaving dreams, thinking big, asking yourself, "Who am I and who and what do I want to be?" And for others, sometimes for reasons beyond our control, high school is

something that you just have to get through until the next phase of life comes along.



But as my own story at Serra demonstrates, sometimes the lessons we learn from people about facing challenges, failure and success stay with us long after our ears have heard them. Sometimes we are able to learn from people in our lives long after we part company. For many Serra students, Father Howell is one of these people.

Many of you may not think that you know Father Howell very well and if that's the case it's probably because you are already making good choices and decisions.

In my mind, Father Howell's legacy is in helping those who had worn thin the patience and good-will of teachers. Those who had seemingly squandered the opportunities presented them in a place like Serra where opportunity, wisdom and guidance are plentiful.

In thinking about Father Howell, I think most of St. Jude, the patron saint of hopeless causes — and at Serra, Father Howell has been for many an advocate, a confidant, a friend and sometimes in the reflection of later years, a role model of how to live a life of faith.

Father Howell has always been available to those who were struggling — not with hopelessness but with life's difficulties which for some, come during these years.

There is a passage in the Bible where Jesus is asked why he isn't recognizing the good works of his disciples and his reply to them was that he recognized who was living a just life, but that he was here to help those who were struggling, those who were not attractive in their behavior.

I was part of a group of friends who fell into this category.

For most of us, the prospect of going to college was simply not in the cards. In the hours after school we went to work in trades schools as electricians, plumbers carpenters or volunteer firefighters.

Most of these guys had serious problems at home. There were broken families, alcoholism, absentee fathers, mothers who were too busy working two jobs to cope with the demands imposed by restless, angry and sometimes reckless sons and daughters.

By the time we graduated, all of these guys had seen the back of a police car more than once, had been in trouble for with the law for fighting, or using alcohol or drugs. They had grades that were abysmal, had spent so much time in detention and what was then known as mandatory study, that we were close personal friends of the janitors. Our leader, Tim Whalen, distinguished himself in Padre




#### '88

#### GREG VISTICA '72 RECEIVES PRESTIGIOUS PEA-BODY AWARD

After spending most of his career in print journalism, Greg Vistica '72 applied his reporting skills to a bigger medium — television — this year, and came away with a Peabody Award, considered the most prestigious prize in the electronic media industry.

Vistica adapted a piece he had written for the New York Times Magazine exploring Senator Bob Kerrey's role in a Vietnam War mission that ended in an alleged massacre of women and children. The story, entitled "Memories of a Massacre," aired on 60 Minutes II on CBS News, and examined two dramatically different accounts of what happened in the village of Thanh Phong in February of 1969.

After graduating from Serra, Vistica, who went by the nickname "Buzz," went on to earn his undergraduate degree in international relations at San Francisco State. He wasn't introduced to journalism until his senior year, but when he returned to SF State for his master's degree, he split his thesis between international relations and journalism.

Vistica's piece on Kerrey reached the finalist stage in judging for the 2001 Pulitzer Prize as

## **Reaching Out**

#### SERRA ALUM TRAVELS TO INDIA TO BUILD HOUSES

For two and a half weeks in March I was fortunate to have been part of a trip that no doubt was the experience of a lifetime. I was joining a group of fourteen other individuals who would be participating in Habitat for Humanities Global Village program in Thiruvananthapuram, Kerala, India.

After a grueling 35-hour trip, I landed in Bombay, ready to meet up with the Habitat group that was co-led by Una Kinsella, sister of Serra graduate Patrick Kinsella '86.

We proceeded to fly to Thiruvananthapuram where we were met by local members of the Habitat affiliate there. The landscape there was surprisingly tropical, with numerous palm trees and beautiful beaches. Soon enough, however, I realized that there was so much work to be done that relaxing in this beautiful setting would not be an option.

The work was very fulfilling as we were involved with three different projects. The first involved demolishing an unusable home which had been ransacked by 30 years of monsoons. We carried away the remains of the house in buckets made out of old tires. The work was done in 95 degree heat, but with good teamwork, we had the area cleared in three days. When we finished carting away the debris, local shamans performed a dedication ceremony which would prepare the site for the new 300 square foot residence to be built on that site.

The next project was to carry cinder blocks up to a site where a home was being built and we all pitched in to do some of the actual masonry work. After three days on that site, we had nearly completed a

new structure.

Finally, with the help of local workers, we all constructed a roof on a newly built house. All in all the work was very satisfying and we were helped by eager townspeople who were more than happy to volunteer their services.

We were fed daily by a group of nuns who were of the order of the Daughters of Charity, and they prepared an amazing display of local cuisine.

In addition to all of the work, we were treated to a day at a local resort on the Arabian Sea, a demonstration of yoga, a team dinner at a local restaurant and more than enough time to explore this beautiful southern Indian city of more than one million people.

After our work was completed we flew to Delhi, and enjoyed seeing the Taj Mahal as well as the ancient city of Jaipur.

The experience was truly life changing.





Senior Patrick Nagle, who won high-school All-American




Junior Dan Buell earned a spot on the WCAL team, and also won the De La Salle Tournament after shooting a 71 at Diablo Country

#### **VOLLEYBALL** SERRA SQUAD RULES LEAGUE PLAY

ead volleyball coach Brian Belding and his 2002 team made Serra history this year, as the WCAL undefeated league champions.

Although the team fell just slightly short of their goal to win CCS, they accomplished more than any past Serra volleyball team, by beating Bellarmine three times, and getting past CCS quarterfinals.

Belding is most proud of the compliment that De La Salle High School's head volleyball coach paid the Padres.

"He said that this year's Serra squad looked more like a college team than any other high school team he'd ever seen," said Belding. "We truly ran a college-level offense effectively, with an attacking setter, two strong middles, outside hitters who can terminate any rally, and an opposite hitter who could attack effectively from all six positions."

In early March, the Padres traveled south to Santa Barbara to play in the Laguna Blanca Classic Tournament. It was during the playoffs of this tournament that the Padres first gelled as a team, according to Belding. Serra pounded South Pasadena High School of Los Angeles and Viewpoint High School of Santa Barbara behind an overwhelming serving and hitting performance by junior Phil Mathews.

On March 30, Serra ventured onto NCS turf to play in the elite Spartan Classic hosted by De La Salle. The Padres came out strong, sweeping Monte Vista from the East Bay and Sir Francis Drake High School of the North Bay. Serra battled the number one seed, De La Salle, defeating them 15-10, but ran out of steam during the second game, losing 10-15. Although De La Salle eventually won the tournament in decisive fashion over Deer Valley, the Padres soundly defeated El Cerrito High School to secure third place.

On April 27, the Padres played in the Los Gatos tournament, featuring the best competition in the CCS. The last game of the championship match, against the St. Francis Lancers, was a true nail-biter. Late in the game, junior Justin Schneider and senior Chris Stagnaro collided

diving for a ball, and Stagnaro continued to play the match, even though it was later discovered that he had sustained a minor concussion.

"That's intensity!" said Belding, who later named Stagnaro the best defensive player of the 2002 season.

The Padres finished the Los Gatos championship in first place.

The highlight game of the season, however,

was on March 19, when the Padres took on Bellarmine. Prior to their match-up, Bellarmine's record was 72-0 — undefeated in the league for a decade. Serra went on a 15-4 run behind Stagnaro's blocking and digging, senior Chris McKenna's ball distribution and Mathews' 11 kills. The Padres walked off the Bellarmine court as the first visiting team to win at Bellarmine, and the first WCAL team to defeat them since the inception of the league.

Senior Chris McKenna, who at 6'7" is a skilled setter with the best attack in the region, won the Serra Blanket Award. McKenna was also selected second team All-WCAL.

Meanwhile, junior Phil Matthews was named the best offensive player. He was also the first junior ever selected as the WCAL MVP.

Most Improved Player, senior Jermaine Randolph, was selected for the WCAL first team, and also received the Shea Award, the highest schoolwide recognition for a senior athlete.

# BASKETBALL PADRES FINISH AS RUNNER-UPS IN NORCAL PLAYOFFS

After a 9-3 league finish, the Serra Padres made it to the Northern California Playoffs for the fourth time in school history, and finished as runner-ups in Division I.

"We had a very successful season," said head coach Chuck Rapp. "We 'ran the table' the second half of league, beating every team in the league."

The season was full of highlights, including a "Jungle Game" that was dramatically preempted by a broken water main that shut down the campus on the night of January 16.

But the most intense game of the year was played against Archbishop Riordan in early February. The Padres played in front of a packed house, with standing room only in the gym. At the time, Riordan was undefeated in the league, but the Padres pushed the game into overtime, and defeated the league leaders 62-54. The victory was appreciated even more post-season, when Riordan went on to win the state championship.


Key games for the 2002 team included a win against Sacred Heart on January 30 and a victory over St. Francis on February 1. Both of these teams later won CCS championships. The Padres also swept St. Ignatius, defeating the Wildcats 44-39 on January 17 and 53-48 on February 8.

Standout players included senior Paul Shamieh, who was chosen for first team All-WCAL, and first team All-County. Shamieh also earned the Blanket Award. Senior Delphino Williams and Zach Rand also earned Honorable Mention All-WCAL.

Vic Esposto, who will return as a senior this fall, won the Serra Basketball Award.


