

The state's first independent youth orchestra, the California Youth Symphony is one of the



This is a challenging accomplishment, achieved by only five percent of all Boy Scouts. This honored group includes former President Gerald R. Ford, former Senator and NBA Hall of Famer Bill Bradley, Academy Award winning Director Steven Spielberg, Astronaut Neil Armstrong, and our own Director of Institutional Advancement, Mr. Michael Peterson and Science Department Chairperson, Mr. Rob Solari.

Adam began his scouting days in Den 5 of Cub Scout Pack 175, where he advanced to the rank of Webelo and earned his Arrow of Light. In fifth grade, he joined Boy Scout Troop 175. SERRA RECEIVES HIGH MARKS FROM WASC

In 2003, the Western Association of School and Colleges (WASC) gave Serra a six-year accreditation, with a three-year review. The review process required that we complete a midterm report and host a visiting team for a one-day visit in 2006.

In April of 2006, members of the original visiting team, Sr. Carolyn McCormack, O.P. President of Flintridge Sacred Heart Academy in La Canada and Gary Cannon, Assistant Principal: Student Services at Sacred Heart Cathedral Preparatory in San Francisco visited our campus to review our progress, meet with our faculty, staff, and students, and observe teaching in numerous classrooms.

The Serra faculty and staff met in the library later that day to listen to Sister Carolyn's and Mr. Cannon's observations. Sr. Carolyn and Mr. Cannon highly complemented the entire Serra community stating, "We commend each of you for the significant investment of time, energy, commitment and creativity that has resulted in this excellent Mid-term Report. It has been a pleasure and privilege to re-visit the school and to see the evident growth that has taken place in these past three years. Most important to both of us is the clear, strong commitment to the Catholic identity and mission of Junipero Sera High School."

They further commented on the clear and collaborative leadership of the administration, the effective work of the department chairs in curriculum development, the "vibrant" teaching by the faculty using a variety of methodologies, and the commitment to a strong athletic program that develops the whole person. In addition, they noted the strong planning for the future through the newly established Board of Regents and the new Assistant Principal for Student Services that will ensure the "continued growth and success of the mission of Junipero Serra high School." They ended their comments with "We applaud your work!"

The Serra community was affirmed that our effort to provide the best education to the whole person was recognized by skilled educators observing our community in action, and we were motivated to continue our mission!


Mark Cunanan '05 Speaks to Theology Students About Filipino world war II Veterans

One of our newest Serra alums, Mark Cunanan '05, returned to Serra in March to speak to theology students about the "Veteranos" or Pilipino World War II Veterans and what he feels is his "cultural responsibility" to help them in their battle to receive equitable benefits for fighting alongside the U.S. during WW II.

During his fall semester, Mark joined a ten-week internship program called PACE (Pilipino American Collegiate Endeavors), which provided him the opportunity to learn about his Filipino history, culture and community.

Mark also spoke to stduents about an organization called SAVE (Student Action for Veterans Equity), which is a San Francisco Bay Area based coalition of youth and students working towards getting the Veterans Equity Bills passed in Congress.

Basketball Star Decensae White '06 assaults the Serra Record Books




When the Padres walked off the court at St. Mary's College on March 9 following a devastating loss to DeLaSalle in the Northern Cal semi-finals, one of the most outstanding careers in Serra basketball history came to an end. Decensae White, who helped bring six basketball championship banners to the rafters of the gym, had played his last game.


Decensae began his assault on the Serra record books as a sophomore coming off the bench until starter John Moe went down with an injury shortly before the CCS championship game. Thrust into the starting lineup, he had the unenviable task of guarding the WCAL Player of the Year Paul Phanguerra from Mitty. He held his own that night as the Padres came from behind to capture the first of three consecutive CCS titles. The next year, with Decensae entrenched in the starting line-up, he became part of the "Big Three,, with Tom McMahon (now playing at Penn) and Chaz Thomas (a

starter at Cal Poly), which led Serra to its greatest season ever -- a Nor Cal Championship and a berth in the State Championship game against Westchester. This game marked Decensae's greatest accomplishment -- both as a team and as an individual. From the team perspective, it meant that "Serra had reached the top." He added that people had "given us up for dead when we lost some games early, but now we proved them all wrong." From the personal perspective, he was the leading scorer in the game with 17 points, two more than Westchester's heralded Amir Johnson who went straight from high school to playing for the NBA's Detroit Pistons.

With three starters from last year's team gone, Decensae knew he would have to assume the leadership role for this year's Padres. He wanted to make sure we "played the right wayget back to that old Serra 'D'." He did this and more -- playing some point guard, leading the team in rebounds and scoring, and averaging a "double-double" for the season. There were games when, according to Coach Chuck Rapp, "Decensae just put the team on his back and carried us to a win."



Although the season ended so disappointingly, the honors for Decensae began to pile in. He was named the WCAL Player of the Year, the County Player of the Year, All-Metro first team and 2nd team All-State. He also broke four of Tim Kennedy's (Class of 95) school records along the way including most points in a season (691), highest season scoring average (20.9), most field goals in a season (237) and most free throws in a career (328). John Carmichael's (class of '62) record

of most free throws in a season also fell. He nearly broke four others, including Kennedy's career scoring record and Jack Keehan's (class of '67) record of most rebounds in a season. It truly was an amazing season and earned Decensae a scholarship to Texas Tech, where he will play for legendary coach Bob Knight. Despite Knight's famous temper, Decensae is looking forward to playing for him and to life in Lubbock, Texas.

His memories of playing basketball for Serra will always be with him, especially the pre-game stories of Coach Rapp. Decensae smiled when he talked of coach's pregame talk before the 2005 St. Ignatius game and the meaning behind the Japanese characters on the team's warm-up shirts. The story of the "500 Ronin" and their commitment to discipline "brought things into focus for us so that our commitment would be just as great." He hopes that sense of leadership that was handed down from Paul Shamieh '02, to Andew Kochever '03, to Kevin Ochoa '04, to Thomas and McMahon '05, then to him will now be passed on to Travis Haynes and Phoenix O'Rourke and also hopes that future generations of Padres will take the court with a commitment to each other to play hard every night.

JORDAN Sy Matt Hovan '06 "One Swingin' PAdRe"

Imagine if Mozart played in the high school band. That's what it's like to watch Jordan Cox '06 play in a WCAL golf tournament. The Stanford-bound senior has posted some eye-catching golf numbers in his final year at Serra. He's averaged a league-low, 2-under par for nine-hole golf matches and set a WCAL record for the lowest nine-hole match score with a round of 7-under par 29 at San Mateo's Poplar Creek. Even with those numbers, though, Cox makes it seem like it's just another day at the office. After posting his record-breaking score, he was unconcerned about the accolades. He scurried off to the practice green to work on his putting game. It seemed to pay off.

The next day, Cox shot a 5-under par 31 in a match against Mitty at San Jose Muni. Over the course of two days and 18 holes, Cox was 12-under par and made 12 birdies without a single bogey. He was promptly named "Athlete of the Week" by both the San Jose Mercury News and San Mateo Daily Journal.

"Jordan's pretty modest about his accomplishments," said varsity golf coach Joe Hession. "He lets his actions speak for themselves. I've never heard him brag or say anything negative about his opponents. He just goes out and beats them."

It all started in the backyard of his Redwood Shores home when Jordan began hitting the little white ball with a plastic golf club. At the tender age of 12, he broke par for the first time with a round of 70 at Green Hills Country Club in Millbrae. Not long after that, Cox decided to shelf his soccer cleats and baseball bats and dedicate himself to the golf links.

"I'd played a lot of other sports as a kid and I really like soccer and baseball; but around sixth or seventh grade, I decided golf was the sport I wanted to pursue," Cox said. "I decided myself that it was the sport for me."

No one can argue with that choice. After spending his freshman year at Sacred Heart Prep, Cox transferred to Serra for his sophomore year. He led the Serra golf team to WCAL and CCS championships last year, and the number three ranking in the state. He was voted team MVP for the past three seasons and named to the all-WCAL golf team.

"I really enjoyed Sacred Heart," Cox said. "It's a great school, but I wanted to come to Serra because it has a great mix of academics and athletics. I knew the Serra golf team was always competitive and played in top-notch tournaments so that was important to me."

Cox's deft putting and 300-yard drives did not go unnoticed by colleges across the country. Next year, he will take his game to Stanford University on a full golf scholarship.

"It came down to either Duke or Stanford," Cox said. "I chose Stanford because of the history of its golf program with players like Tom Watson

and Tiger Woods coming out of there. I thought it was a good fit."

Jordan, who has maintained a 3.6 GPA while taking AP courses at Serra, intends to pursue a business degree at Stanford, but he also has his eye on the PGA tour. His accomplishments as a junior golfer indicate he could be a success at the professional level. Last summer, he won the American Junior Golf Association Rolex Tournament of Champions. Two summers ago, he won the British Junior Open in Scotland and also placed second at the US Junior Open. He also qualified for the US Amateur the past two seasons.

"Playing professional golf would be the ultimate," Cox said. "To get paid for doing something you love to do is hard to imagine."

"If anybody has a chance to play on the pro tour it's Jordan," coach Hession said. "Not only is he a talented athlete, he's a hard worker who never stops practicing. He's also got the perfect demeanor for a golfer. He's a hard guy to rattle. Nothing seems to bother him. He's always calm. In fact, the bigger the challenge the better he plays."

Jordan's opponents know how dangerous he can be. In an early season match against Bellarmine, Cox had the rockiest start of his life, hitting two balls out of bounds on the first tee at Silver Creek Country Club and taking a quadruple bogey. Many junior golfers would fall apart at that point, but Cox proceeded to play the next seven holes at one-under par.

"I think that is one of the things that makes him a good player," Bellarmine coach Leo Ruth said. "He can have a disastrous hole and just forget about it. I know how he plays, so I figured he would come around and finish even-par by the end of the match."

And . . . if he did make the tour, who would be in his dream foursome?

"I'd love to be in a foursome with Tiger Woods, Jack Nickalus and Phil Mickelson," Cox said. "They are some of the best players of our time. I think I could learn something from every one of them."

Cox also has learned a few lessons inside the walls of Junipero Serra High School. "Serra has been invaluable to me," he said. "It has taught me organizational skills and discipline. Those are things that will be important for my success in college and for the rest of my life."

It appears Jordan Cox's road to success has just begun.

"Alumni Memories" Classic Moments from Padres' Past

Serra's Beginnings: The Unvarnished Truth

ar w

arah? Sarah? What's that, a girl's school?," friends would ask

"No. It's a new archdiocese high school for boys staffed by priests from the seminary and parishes. It's named for the California missionary priest."

"Never match Bellarmine or St. Ignatius," they'd reply.

Recall that the Serra of 1944 bore little resemblance to the Serra of 2006, with its elite prerogative of skimming off the cream of the applying crop. No way! If you graduated from a local Catholic grammar school, you were accepted. If you couldn't afford it, the bill they gave you was blank. A motley conglomeration we were, a rough-and-tumble mix of the worst and best of Our Lady of Angels, St. Catherine's, St. Matthew's and other assorted parishes tossed together into a converted San Mateo grade school off "The Alameda" in September of 1944. At first, there were only freshman and sophomore years with junior and senior years added progressively. Original student body consisted of eighty-six, with a faculty of five.

Today, we alumni from those rollicking days shudder at the contrast between the young dedicated priest who came to Serra with such grand dreams and the student body that assaulted them. From our conduct, we might have resembled a minimum-security reform school or a teenage version of an "Our Gang" comedy. We were bad!

HORRIBLE DICTU

A certain sophomore (no names mentioned) invented a time bomb armed with a fire cracker that when inserted into the barrel of a construction pipe would explode ten minutes after we returned from recess. The word would be whispered from room to room, "bomb set."

On the day of the school's dedication, we took Archbishop Mitty by the arms and sequestered him in the principal's office where he agreed to decree one day of vacation to celebrate the event. (Father Breen was embarrassed, but we got our day!)

The third string quarterback got expelled for tossing a stink bomb in the library. On rainy days, the football team would form a phalanx — like in Caesar's Gallic wars — and charge down the middle of the hallway.

At one Fathers' Club Carnival, they offered cases of donated Regal Pale Beer if the person put his chip on the right number. We would play for our "parents" and then offer to carry the beer to our father's trunk, but instead stashed it in the eucalyptus grove on the edge of the campus.

FATHER ZOPH

The battle, however, was hardly one-sided. "Jug," parent conferences and expulsion were the weapons employed by the faculty. Not equal combat, but spirited.

Father John Zoph of late beloved memory was not always the gentle elder statesman of his latter years. As a young priest in 1946, he would blaze with an ascending redness from his Roman color to his hot eyes. "Jug for the whole class," he would thunder like Jove tossing a lightning bolt and we would all translate an hour of Latin after school.

One time we "set up" Father Zoph with a trick question regarding an arcane grammar rule that he had forgotten. Fifty years later at his jubilee, he remembered the trap, who set it and who sprung it.

FOOTBALL AND RELIGION

Like the NFL draft, the Serra football team needed bodies. If yours was big enough, you were signed up. No choice, no argument. Our first practice field consisted of a parched baseball outfield in San Mateo where we scrimmaged in gagging dust with scrapped knees and elbows. They equipped us with used leather helmets with no face guards and we would return from practice to change in a locker room without showers. On the way back aching and smelly, we sang ribald songs.

Beyond core education, we also received a firm grounding in our faith that armed us for atheistic college professors, fraternity bull sessions and the moral challenges facing every young man. Being taught by priest continued on next page

added an important dimension. If we had a problem, we could talk it over with a favorite teacher "under the seal" and receive sound spiritual and practical advice. (Note: Every teacher at Serra for our four years was an ordained priest.)

RETREATS AND HARD REALITIES

Off-campus retreats also served as part of our religious education. After a day of devotions and silence, we would kneel in a darkened chapel and, from the back, a retreat priest would intone:

'The doctor comes into your hospital room and says "Son, I have some very sad news for you." And, at the tender age of 16, you looked into the abyss of eternity and the state of your eternal soul.

Or...

"Your girlfriend, with eyes red from crying appears at your door with her father and older brother. 'I demand to speak to your parents,' growls her father".

INVENTING OUR OWN TRADITIONS

Not having a tradition handed down to us, we invented our own. We were tough, not afraid to challenge schools with bigger student bodies and better teams. Serra demanded mental toughness too, that willingness to stick with a difficult assignment into the wee hours. We were resilient; without a practice field and with limited equipment, we fielded credible teams. We were loyal to our own with broad attendance at sporting events and school activities. And we respected excellence; if a person did well, his classmates saluted him. There was no shame in winning an inter-school competition or working hard enough for the rare 'A.'

LATE BLOOMING APPRECIATION

Not until years later did we realize what had been done for us. Despite our groaning and boyish peccadilloes, we had been given a topflight classical education! Not fancy, but fundamental with 4 years of history, religion (including moral theology), Latin, speech, English (plus literature) mathematics up to trigonometry as well as physics and chemistry. But when it was done, we could write a comprehensive essay and solve problems with both inductive and deductive reasoning. From the faculty's credo of "no mercy," we developed mature study habits that served us all the years of our education (and life). From our small 1948 class emerged future graduates from Stanford, Berkeley, San Jose State, Santa Clara, as well as two priests, two doctors and one PhD.

Boys Becoming Men Together

Above all, the "Serra experience" nurtured the bonding of boys becoming men together and the forging of friendships that last to this day. At alumni gatherings, we greet one another as if we haven't seen them for a week despite the decades in between. At a recent lunch, Father Dan Cardelli (of generous beam nick named "Father Buns") reminded the author that "we would have won the San Mateo game except for a fumble by the fullback."


In conclusion, we, the Class of 1948, might charge to the present Serra colossus — just as Knute Rockne croaked to the Notre Dame team about winning one for the Gipper — "If you ever get the chance when you are beating Bellarmine, POUR IT ON." (We lost 62-6 in 1947!)



AN IMPRESSIVE KINSTON INDIANS SEASON OPENER DEBUT FOR SERRA ALUM CHUCK LOFGREN '04



Twenty-year old Serra Alum Chuck Lofgren '04 blew through opposing batters in his impressive Carolina League debut, leading the Kinston Tribe to a 4-1 victory over the Wilmington Blue Rocks. Lofgren struck out eight batters, giving up just two hits in five innings of work, looking right at home during the Indian's home opener.

The Serra baseball star visited Serra last December as a Booster Club guest speaker where he discussed "Life After Serra: Launching My Professional Career." The following are some excerpts from his speech:

"I think I must have known since I was around seven or eight that I wanted to become a professional baseball player when I grew up. I always loved going to practice, spending time on the field with my friends and especially playing in the games. I couldn't wait for weekends to roll around because I knew there would be a game and the thrill and excitement would flow through my veins once again. The feeling you experience when you get a clutch base hit or hit a smashing home run is unexplainable.

My dad spent many hours with me at the park hitting grounders and fly balls to help me improve my skills. We really enjoyed our time together practicing and developing a very close relationship of caring and trust. One of my fondest memories is when my dad used to imitate a radio sports announcer and he would call my pitches or my batting practice as if it were being broadcast on the radio. He would pretend the bases were loaded and Chuck Lofgren was coming up to bat. He would call the pitches and then when I got a hit, he would say, 'It's a drive over the right fielder's head; it's going, going, and you can tell that one good-bye.' It made practice so much fun that I couldn't wait to get back to the ballpark.

As I look back on my high school years at Serra, I fondly remember my classmates, teammates, teachers and coaches who were all instrumental in helping me attain the goals I had set for my future. From Mr. Monaghan to Mr. Houle to

Mr. Jefferies and Coach Pete Jensen, I received excellent coaching and an opportunity to establish my presence as a significant contributor on their baseball teams. I have so many great memories of my high school baseball experience in the WCAL that it's hard to describe which one is the most memorable. The one that sticks out the foremost in my mind is when I was a Junior and we faced St. Francis in the 8th inning of the WCAL Championship at Santa Clara University. We were in extra innings with the score tied at 5 to 5. I passed Mr. Jefferies on my way to the on-deck circle and he said (now I have to clean

this up a bit) 'I'm cold and I want to go home -- just get up there and hit a home run so we can get out of here.' I came up to bat and launched the first pitch over the parking lot at Buck Shaw Stadium. The crowd roared and I'll never forget how I felt rounding those bases, listening to the Serra fans cheer. I even had a few St. Francis dads come up to me after the game and tell me that they had never seen a ball hit that far by a high school player. The Padres went home that night ecstatic that we had won the WCAL Championship. There was an eclipse occurring at the same time I hit the ball and it came to be known as the 'Moon Shot' on

High School Sports Focus. Cal Hi Sports ran clips of the 'Moon Shot' for over a month after the season ended and they named me the High School Player of the Year.

My Catholic education has always been very important to me. I have always been close to God and the four years I spent at Serra helped me realize that my talent in baseball is a gift from God. Some people are blessed with brilliant minds, some are blessed with artistic ability, some are musicians -- but I was blessed with exceptional athleticism and a powerful left arm. I have a very strong work ethic and an extremely competitive spirit. I thank God every day for helping me with my baseball career and I know that if I make it to the major leagues, he will be beside me showering his guidance and support and

reassuring me when times get tough."


